<p>With the COVID-19 crisis, our goals and accomplishments took an unexpected turn. As with everyone, we had to adapt and move on. Our priorities became centered on the health and wellbeing of our Students, Volunteer, Staff and families more than ever before..</p> <p>However, our immediate need to close for lessons was only one element. We offered support to our families and pulled together as a community. Our everyday responsibilities of caring for our wonderful herd of horses became both our focus as well as our therapy. The horses became the "thing" that felt normal during a very strange and uncertain time.</p> <p>We worked on staying in touch with our students and making videos to keep them engaged. We held two Drive-Thru Pony Parades that brought everyone together in a safe way. We incorporated a Food Drive into the Parade to help others in the community.</p> <p>We wrote grants and educated ourselves as to how we could operate a safe reopening. We researched new resources and methods of engaging with our donors and peers.</p> <p>Gratefully, on June 1st, we resumed lessons. We incorporated new sanitation measures and modified methods of operation to keep everyone safe as safe as possible. ## Impact Narrative: Volunteer-Jere McFarland

Jere came to learn about REINS while he focused on recovering from cancer treatments. Just six months before he started volunteering, Jere had just finished his 3<sup>rd</sup> round of chemotherapy treatments.

Not only is Jere one of the most tender-hearted people you'll ever meet, but he is a fighter through and through. Jere is one of our senior volunteers, but that has never slowed him down. Jere has built some incredible bonds with our students, particularly our youngsters. Monday morning at 9:00 AM, Jere goes with a student who loves hats and every Monday Jere will remember to wear a different hat for that student. He also has a for one heart one of our students that participates in ground lessons. The attention and care he gives them is priceless. Jere smoothed out river rocks, "wishing rocks", as he calls them. He will often bring them for our kids to keep as a memento. These are a few examples of how he goes out of his way for our students.

Jere was one of our only volunteers that continued to help us through our Covid-19 shutdown and what a huge help he was. At our Drive-through Pony Parade, during the shutdown and we were happily surprised that our students made signs with Jere's name on them. It was then, we really started to realize the impact Jere has made on our program.

Jere has shared with us that "REINS is what gets him out of bed and moving". He said, "REINS gives him purpose in his life.". In turn, Jere gives us so much more. REINS is honored to have Jere volunteering with us.

During their two-month COVID-19 closure, the REINS staff cared for their herd of 20 therapy horses. Staff worked diligently to develop, prepare and implement new safety measures for staff, students and volunteers at the facility.

The local nonprofit organization has experienced community support at every level during this time. REINS is grateful to be the recipient of COVID -19 relief funds from Legacy Endowment Community Foundation and LA84 Foundation as well as receiving ongoing support from Fallbrook Regional Health District. Their contributions helped offset the additional expenses required to reopen safely under new Centers for Disease Control and Prevention guidelines.

Despite three canceled fundraisers, a few sponsors donated their pledged funds. Longtime volunteer Adria Mashburn led a social media fundraiser that generated an outpouring of donations. Other volunteers generously forwarded their stimulus checks to REINS to assist with the care of horses and operations.
